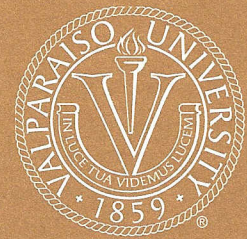

## THE PROCESSION

At Valparaiso University, the university marshal, David L. Schroeder, attired in a red robe, followed by the university flag and the federal flag, heads the academic procession. Members of the administration then walk in, followed by the faculties, the academic deans, and the provost. Each grouping is led by a marshal, attired in a red robe. At the end of the procession is the president of the University.

## FOUNDATION MEMBERS

### Richard Baepler

A former professor of theology and law who served a variety of administrative roles at Valparaiso University, Richard Baepler was an early advocate of the importance of the University's affiliation with organizations such as Phi Beta Kappa. A distinguished scholar and author, he most recently wrote *Flame of Faith, Lamp of Learning: A History of Valparaiso University*. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Concordia Seminary in St. Louis and a doctorate from the University of Chicago.

### Richard Duesenberg

Richard Duesenberg earned bachelor's and law degrees from Valparaiso University and a master's in law from Yale Law School. After serving on the law faculty at New York University, he began a long association with Monsanto Co., retiring in 1995 as senior vice president, general counsel and secretary. He later was a visiting law professor at St. Louis University. He is a lifelong advocate of the arts as evidenced in both his leadership and his philanthropy.

### Heather Mitchell Johnson

Heather Johnson earned her doctor of medicine degree from Yale Medical School after exemplifying the breadth of learning prized by Phi Beta Kappa by earning majors in chemistry and Spanish at Valparaiso University. A distinguished physician with a specialty in obstetrics and gynecology associated with the Women's Physician's Association, she previously was affiliated with hospitals in the Washington, D.C., area. She is a member of the Board of Directors of Stone Ridge School of the Sacred Heart in Bethesda, Maryland.

### Lillian Peters Mullin

After earning her bachelor's degree at Valparaiso University and a master's at the University of Chicago, Lillian Mullin began a career in public service as a cartographer with the Army Chief of Staff. She later served the Department of State in the Netherlands, Bermuda, Canada and Germany and was Counselor of Embassy in Macedonia. She has helped organize Elderhostels in Washington, D.C., and is recipient of a National Alumni Service Award from the American Foreign Service Association.

### Andrew Rodovich

Andrew Rodovich is magistrate judge for the United States District Court, Northern District of Indiana. He previously was chief deputy prosecutor in Lake County, Indiana. Earlier he was a referee in Hammond, Indiana, City Court and partner in a Hammond law firm. Judge Rodovich is a member of the Board of Directors of the Hammond Education Foundation. He earned his bachelor's degree with a major in political science and his law degree from Valparaiso University.

## THE PHI BETA KAPPA SOCIETY

Phi Beta Kappa, founded in 1776 at the College of William and Mary, is the nation's oldest and most prestigious academic honor society. The Society's name comes from the first letters of its Greek motto, "Love of learning is the guide of life." The Society recognizes and encourages excellence in liberal learning and has as its objectives not merely knowledge but also intellectual integrity, tolerance, and a broad range of intellectual interests. Guided by national stipulations, which include mathematics, foreign language, and excellence in a cross-section of liberal arts and sciences, each chapter develops and maintains its own membership criteria. The Society encourages members not only to typify its values but also to work with others to perpetuate these values on and off campus.

The golden key signifying Phi Beta Kappa membership is widely recognized as a symbol of academic achievement in the liberal arts and sciences at the undergraduate level. There are chapters at 270 institutions of higher learning.

At the time a new chapter is formally installed, its charter members are authorized to elect Foundation Members. Five such members are being honored today in testimony to their commitment to the study of the liberal arts and sciences and in recognition of their achievements that embody the high standards of the Society.

The Eta of Indiana Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa will initiate its first class of students in May 2004. Those initiates, representing approximately 10 percent of students graduating with a major in a liberal arts or sciences field, will be elected on the basis of the national stipulations for membership.

### John Churchill

John Churchill, currently on leave from his position as professor of philosophy at Hendrix College (Arkansas), is a former Rhodes Scholar who completed his post-graduate work at Yale University writing on Wittgenstein and philosophy of religion. He is widely published, not only in scholarly journals in the fields of philosophy and religion, but also as essayist and short story writer. He has served in a wide variety of administrative positions at Hendrix College, including vice president for academic affairs and dean of the college, interim president, and chair of the Department of Philosophy. At The Phi Beta Kappa Society he is responsible for administration of all programs and activities of the Society, including the Visiting Scholars program and publication of *The American Scholar* and *The Key Reporter*.

### Niall W. Slater

Niall Slater's 15-year tenure as a national leader in The Phi Beta Kappa Society culminated in August 2003 with his election to the presidency of the organization. Dr. Slater is professor of classics and director of the Center for Language, Literature, and Culture at Emory University. He is widely published, notably in the area of ancient theatre, and his first monograph, *Plautus in Performance: The Theatre of the Mind*, was designated by Choice as one of the outstanding academic books of 1985. He has published two additional monographs and dozens of articles. Professor Slater has served as a Fellow at the University of Konstanz, Germany; Clare Hall, Cambridge; Magdalen College, Oxford; the American Academy in Rome; and the American School of Classical Studies in Athens.

### Frederick J. Crosson

Frederick Crosson, former Cavanaugh professor of humanities at the University of Notre Dame, is among the select few whose academic career balanced dedication to undergraduate teaching, significant service to the profession, and scholarly research and publication. Now retired, Professor Crosson served in leadership roles in The Phi Beta Kappa Society for more than 20 years, including a term as president from 1997 to 2000, and in the North Central Association of Schools and Colleges. His scholarship, which includes editing and contribution to five monographs and more than 50 articles in scholarly books and journals, has focused on philosophical consideration of issues in science and religion. He spent one year each in Paris and Louvain as French Government Fellow and as Belgian American Foundation Fellow.
