## Plane crashes onto island; survivors unlikely

AP—(New York)

Montana Air flight 690 crashed into the ocean earlier today leaving the varied passengers and crew dead, sources said.

Our sources indicate that a crash landing was forced on an island after fragments from a satellite hit the plane during flight.

#### THE CHRIST COLLEGE FRESHMAN PROGRAM

The Freshman Program in Christ College includes a two-semester sequence of honors courses that apply higher standards for recognizing the academic achievements of the abler student and are distinguishable from non-honors courses by their greater depth and wider intellectual purposes. Thus, honors courses do not simply require more work than other courses; rather, they invite the more curious student into the rigors and rewards of the life of the mind by offering him or her an integrated approach to university studies and subtler methods of independent inquiry.

The two honors courses in the Freshman Program, *Texts and Contexts: Traditions of Human Thought I and II*, take approximately half of the student's time each semester. They fulfill many of the University requirements in English, history, theology, and the social sciences which must be met by *all* VU graduates. Therefore, students from *all* colleges at the University may participate in the Program.

Texts and Contexts offers students an opportunity to study selected great works of humankind and to engage the lively ideas that have shaped its traditions. The close reading of primary texts is accompanied by a survey of the wider aspects of the historical epoch and milieu appropriate to each text. Semesters are arranged in chronological units that also have a topical focus—the fall semester beginning with antiquity and the spring semester concluding with the modern world. Readings are drawn from history, literature, philosophy, and religion. Supplementary materials to illuminate the texts and their contexts may include biographies, artistic works, and scholarly and critical essays.

The Freshman Program is devoted to reading, discussing, and arguing about the crucial issues raised in great works; it offers the student frequent occasions to practice the liberal arts. These are the arts—or skills—involved in critical reading and coherent writing as well as disciplined inquiry and argument. These arts are fundamental to all intellectual work wherever it occurs and whenever it is free.

The Freshman Program provides for the common exchange of ideas among faculty and students about what they are reading and writing. Once a week the entire group (approximately 80 students and six faculty) meets for a common lecture. In addition, students spend four to five hours a week in discussion groups of 14 or fewer. Weekly student essays are carefully read and critiqued by faculty mentors.

To balance the critical and literary focus of the daytime classes, the Program also meets one evening each week for group activities connected with the fine and performing arts. During the fall semester these sessions culminate in the Christ College Freshman Production, an original dramatic-musical performance, based on ideas and themes discussed in the Program, and written and produced entirely by students. Oxford Union-style debates of significant current issues are the focus of the spring semester.

In addition to *Texts and Contexts*, the student takes two or three other courses elsewhere in the University during the freshman year. For example, most students in the College of Arts and Sciences would be meeting general education requirements in natural sciences, mathematics, or foreign language. Students in the professional colleges take the basic courses in their professional programs. Additional honors courses are offered in Christ College at the sophomore, junior, and senior levels. Students who follow prescribed sequences of honors courses may graduate with Christ College honors distinctions. Christ College students are expected to maintain an average grade point of 3.3 (B+) in all coursework at the University and in Christ College courses.

# THE CHRIST COLLEGE FRESHMAN PROGRAM DRAMA WORKSHOP AND FRESHMAN PRODUCTION

The Christ College Freshman Program is a two-semester sequence of interdisciplinary honors courses titled *Texts and Contexts: Traditions of Human Thought*. Throughout the course students read selected great works of history, literature, drama, philosophy, and religion and consider closely the ideas that have shaped a range of traditions. Ideas are explored in many ways—through critical reading and close analysis of texts; through careful research and focused expository and persuasive writing; through scholarly lectures, faculty-guided small group discussion among classmates, and formal public debate; and through creative dramatic and musical expression.

This last means of exploration—creative dramatic and musical expression—is guided and molded during the fall semester in the weekly Freshman Program Drama Workshop. In just ten weeks of intense collaboration, the students who make up the honors college freshman class write, stage, and perform an original 90-minute theatre piece with music based on ideas and themes encountered in *Texts and Contexts*. The Christ College Freshman Production is performed for the campus community and the public in mid-November each year.

The Freshman Program Drama Workshop and Christ College Freshman Production are produced under the supervision of Professor John Steven Paul, PhD, Chair of the Department of Theatre and Television Arts.
