
TEACHING TIPS TUESDAY

Flexibility in the Classroom

On assignment one in my CORE 110 class, I noted many gaps in the students' writing. They demonstrated a variety of different issues and I knew that if I didn't take time to address these issues, I would be setting up my students for

failure on their second writing assignment. So, I decided to introduce some flexibility in the course schedule and not be quite as structured. Deciding on flexibility over structure, I cleared a week from my syllabus to allow room for

one-on-one personal writing conferences with each student. During the conferences, we

discussed their biggest questions and the issues that I noticed. I noticed a huge improvement in their writing levels after the conferences were over. Students noted that the classroom flexibility gave them "extra time to dedicate to their

draft," "provided the ability to understand how they could revise," and that they would have rather had their syllabus interrupted for a week if that meant they "received a better grade." Don't be afraid to be flexible with your syllabus to meet the needs of your students! Written by Jordin Billings
