CITAL on the Move!

It has been a busy Summer for the CITAL team. While useful links and advice from your colleagues are provided below from Cindy and Gina, I wanted to take a moment to highlight some of the other exciting news in-progress and

on the horizon.

Simple Syllabus Workshops – With Simple Syllabus required for the fall semester, CITAL

held a total of 31 workshops with 50 attendees between June and August. In addition, individual sessions were and are being held by Gina Rue with faculty members and administrators on request.

Quality Matters – Quality Matters (QM) is our Quality Assurance Initiative for the current Higher Learning Commission accreditation cycle. You can find more information on the [CITAL website](#). If you would like to request an account with QM, you can do so through the [CITAL Helpdesk](#).

CITAL Collaboration Space – Renovations in Kretzmann Hall 116/117 are in full swing. The space has been painted, furniture has arrived, and whiteboards and technology will be installed throughout the remainder of September. This new space will allow faculty to collaborate and consult with CITAL staff on teaching and learning.

Learning Management System (LMS) Sandboxes – We are actively recruiting faculty to join us in an evaluation of various LMS platforms (including Blackboard Ultra, Brightspace, and Canvas). You can request an account through the [CITAL Helpdesk](#) and will be asked to test various aspects of each system and complete a survey at the end of the process.

Again, these are just some of the areas we are working on to better support teaching and learning at Valpo. I would like to thank Cindy and Gina for their hard work and the faculty who have collaborated and provided feedback along the way.

Valpo Faculty Respond to Generative AI



At the faculty workshop this August, our keynote speaker [Derek Bruff](#) spoke about four possible faculty responses to AI:

- Red Light: I'll prohibit the use of AI.
- Yellow Light: I'll permit the use of AI, but with limitations.
- Green Light: Let's see what AI can do!
- No Light: I'm not sure yet.

Where do you fall on this spectrum? We interviewed four Valpo faculty who have different views on AI. Sarah Jantzi (Communication and Visual Arts) considers herself as red light for introductory classes, while her colleague Ben Brobst-Renaud is green light and already planning a spring class on AI and Art. Kelly Belanger (University Director of Writing) is comfortable being yellow light, while Sedefka Beck (Economics), a fan of new technology, is green light and hopes to lead a future FLC with others who plan to use AI in their classes.
