

Adjective Endings

der – Words + Following Adjectives

“Der” words include: *all-*, *beid-*, *dies-*, *jed-*, *jen-*, *manch-*, *solch-*, and *welch-*.

	<i>masculine</i>	<i>feminine</i>	<i>neuter</i>	<i>plural</i>
<i>nominative</i>	r ^e	e ^e	s ^e	e ⁿ
<i>accusative</i>	n ⁿ	e ^e	s ^e	e ⁿ
<i>dative</i>	m ⁿ	r ⁿ	m ⁿ	n ⁿ + n
<i>genitive</i>	s ⁿ + s	r ⁿ	s ⁿ + s	r ⁿ

ein – Words + Following Adjectives

“Ein” words include: *ein*, *kein*, *mein*, *dein*, *sein*, *ihr*, *unser*, *euer*, and *Ihr*.

A blank indicates the “ein” word is in its stem form.

<i>nominative</i>	__ ^r	e ^e	__ ^s	e ⁿ
<i>accusative</i>	n ⁿ	e ^e	__ ^s	e ⁿ

Unpreceded Adjectives

Sometimes nouns don’t have a “der” or an “ein” word before it. But, you can still have an adjective! The adjective endings are a little bit different, here.
