

Exploring Caste in America: Recommended Reading & Viewing

When you hear the term "caste," what comes to mind? In <u>Caste, The Origins</u> of <u>Our Discontents</u>, American journalist and Pulitzer Prize winner Isabel Wilkerson examines the concept of caste as a way to understand the origins of American race relations. The author's approach stems from her researched exploration of caste systems in other countries, specifically Nazi Germany and India. Early in the book, Wilkerson offers a startling vocabulary to describe an American caste system, including terms such as *dominant caste, middle caste(s),* and *subordinate caste*. In reading the first few chapters alone, this work of nonfiction has disrupted outdated histories of race while creating space for new lenses and language to confront America's past and present. If you are more inclined to film, consider watching last year's <u>Origin</u>, a powerful movie based on Wilkerson's book (not yet available for streaming). Written and directed by Ava DuVernay,



Origin is not a documentary, but rather a biographical drama. The film adapts Wilkerson's work as an

imaginative retelling of the author's journey, both intellectual and geographical, while researching and wrestling with the ideas that eventually make their way to the pages of *Caste, The Origins of Our Discontents*. If you check out the book or watch the film, I invite you to join me for a cup of coffee sometime...the ideas presented in these deeply moving works call for a shared exploration, within community, and in conversation with one another. – C.
