PROGRAM NOTES, TEXTS AND TRANSLATIONS

Symphony No. 9 in E minor, op. 95: *From the New World*

Dvořák was born near Prague, in Czech Republic. *From the New World*, arguably the most popular of his symphonies was composed between 1892 and 1893, while Dvořák was the director of the National Conservatory of Music of America, in New York City. The 9th symphony was premiered in 1893 with Anton Seidl, conducting the New York Philharmonic at Carnegie Hall. It was an instant success, receiving enthusiastic applause after every movement. The symphony is influenced by spiritual songs and indigenous music that Dvořák heard while in the United States; he said “I am convinced that the future music of this country must be founded on what is called African American music.” Dvořák did not use any native melodies in his symphony, but he acknowledged having composed the piece thinking about the peculiarities of the native melodies he heard, and applied the use of modern orchestration, counterpoint, rhythm and color. The music is composed in four movements, which contain beautiful themes and unforgettable melodies. There are arguments -both in favor and against- about this symphony being a programmatic work, because there seems to be evidence, albeit not definitive, of Dvořák getting inspiration not only from the American landscape that he got to observe when he traveled to the United States, but also from the song “Swing Low, Sweet Chariot” heard in the first movement, not to mention the epic poem *The Song of Hiawatha*, by American poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. This is perhaps the most noticeable reference that lives in the music, particularly in the beautiful second movement, where we are presented with one of the most beautiful passages in orchestral music written for the English Horn, as it sets the mood in a “The Legend begins” fashion, followed by the third movement, where the feeling is a musical suggestion of Indians dancing. The whole symphony demonstrates mastery of composition, and a mix of European (Czech) and more particularly “Dvořákian” idiomatic writing that results in a wonderful, exciting piece of music that proves to be popular and accessible to this day. Dvořák’s 9th *From the New World* was his last symphony, joining other eminent composers such as Beethoven, Schubert, Mahler and Bruckner. This symphony is also known as “New World Symphony.”

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS



Diego Piedra is the Director of Orchestras at Valparaíso University. A strongly driven performer and educator, Dr. Piedra feels at home working on the podium with student and professional orchestras. Recent professional conducting engagements have included the Music Directorship and Conducting of Spectrum Orchestra, visiting orchestral positions at Luther College and the University of Toledo, and guest conducting appearances with the Oakland Symphony Orchestra in Michigan, the National Symphony Orchestra of Costa Rica, and the Municipal Orchestra of Cartago. In Costa Rica Dr. Piedra was in high demand as the orchestral conducting professor at the University of Costa Rica as well as a guest violin teacher and performer in Venezuela, Honduras and Guatemala. He founded the national youth orchestra called Manuel María Gutiérrez at SINEM (the Costa Rican version of Venezuela's El Sistema), and was its Music Director and Conductor from 2009-2011. Since 2014, Dr. Piedra has been Music Director at the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra's Summer String Camp, working as a conductor, violinist and composer. Dr. Piedra is the recipient of an honorable mention from the London Classical Soloists competition in 2017 and from The American Prize, Conductor Division for 2022.

As a professional violinist he has been a member of the prestigious New World Symphony in Miami, South Bend Symphony Orchestra, Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra, Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra, Oakland Symphony Orchestra, the National Symphony Orchestra of Costa Rica and Concertmaster of the Orquesta de Cámara de Costa Rica. Dr. Piedra participated as violinist and assistant conductor in the tour and recording of the University Symphony Orchestra of the University of Michigan (winner of four Grammy awards in 2006), which culminated at Carnegie Hall, New York.



Jeremiah Cawley has led instrumental and vocal ensembles across the US and UK. He sings with the GRAMMY-nominated True Concord and founded the new music ensemble The Box Is Empty. His recorded work includes projects with The Riot Ensemble (London, UK), Solaris Vocal Ensemble (Seattle, WA), and Chamber Cartel (Atlanta, GA). Dr. Cawley's work as tenor soloist is equally varied. He has recently been featured in the Des Moines Choral Festival's performance of Bach's Cantata 140, *Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme*; at the Omaha Under the Radar new music festival singing *Desert Time* for tenor and electronics by composer Nat Evans; and in the Madison Early Music Festival's 400th anniversary performance of Monteverdi's *Vespro della beata virgine*. Dr. Cawley's credits as operatic music director include Puccini's *Suor angelica*, Poulenc's *La voix humaine*, and Britten's *Rape of Lucretia*.

Dr. Cawley's recent published scholarship includes "Understanding Editions: Using CPDL and IMSLP to Develop Early Music Intuition" in *The Choral Conductor's Companion*. He serves on the organizing committee for the Oxford Conducting Institute, where he presented his most recent research, "Neurotic, Weak, and Ultramodern: Coded Language in Gestural Criticism," exploring veiled discrimination in critical judgements of conductors Gustav Mahler and Antonia Brico. Dr. Cawley's previous presentations include the paper "Unconducting Andriessen," which examines the ways that the Dutch avantgarde altered the role of the conductor in music written after 1970. His dissertation, *The Economic, Aesthetic, and Nonprofit Organization of Professional Vocal Ensembles*, was nominated by the University of Washington for ACDA's prestigious Herford Prize.

Dr. Cawley is a sought-after choral clinician, adjudicator, and conducting teacher. He received his MM and DMA from the University of Washington, where he was a student of Geoffrey Boers. He is currently Visiting Assistant Professor of Music at Valparaíso University, having previously held posts at Loras College, Western Kentucky, and Georgia State Universities.



Nathan Leaf is the Director of Choral Activities, Teaching Professor, and Assistant Department Head at North Carolina State University, and is the Artistic Director of the Concert Singers of Cary. A versatile musician, he has garnered critical praise for his work as a conductor and has performed as singer with some of the top vocal ensembles in the country. He has collaborated with many of North Carolina's leading musical organizations, including the North Carolina Symphony, the North Carolina Master Chorale, the Chamber Orchestra of the Triangle, the North Carolina Baroque Orchestra, and the NC HIP Music Festival. In February 2023, he will make his conducting debut with the Raleigh Camerata.

During his tenure at NC State, the choral and vocal areas have experienced significant growth. Choirs under his direction have toured throughout the U.S. and abroad. He has served for many years as a church musician and for five seasons was the Chorus Master for North Carolina Opera. In 2017, Dr. Leaf conducted the North Carolina Men's All State Choir. Leaf sang for eight seasons as a member of the Oregon Bach Festival Chorus, and has performed with several other professional choirs, including Conspirare, True Concord, and the Carnegie Hall Festival Chorus. As part of his doctoral research, he sang with the Swedish male choir Orphei Drängar.

Dr. Leaf earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Valparaiso University and Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in choral conducting from the Butler School of Music at The University of Texas at Austin.

Christopher M. Cock, Senior Research Professor, was the Director of Choral and Vocal Activities at Valparaiso University for 27 years, where he held the inaugural Phyllis and Richard Duesenberg Chair in Lutheran Music and was the founding director of the Bach Institute.

Through his activities as a choral music educator and as a distinguished solo artist, Dr. Cock has forged a unique career path, combining the roles of conductor and performer. He has served as director of choirs for Lutheran Summer Music, the national Lutheran high school music camp. He led the International Choral Invitational in Hong Kong in 2006 and was conductor of the Spivey Hall High School Honor Choir, a festival begun by Robert Shaw. He has conducted All-State Choirs in Minnesota, Georgia and Ohio and the Collegiate Honor Choir in Pennsylvania. He has appeared at Carnegie Hall as guest conductor of the New England Symphonic Ensemble – making appearances as both conductor and soloist at this legendary venue.



At Valparaiso, Dr. Cock founded the Bach Institute in 2004. His experience leading the works of J.S. Bach includes many performances of the Christmas Oratorio, the Mass in B Minor and both passions — on several occasions he has led passions as conductor/evangelist, including the St. John Passion with the Leipzig Baroque Orchestra in the Castle Church, Wittenberg, Germany. These performances marked the beginning of a successful partnership with the Leipzig Baroque Orchestra that continued through 2019.

Dr. Cock established important professional relationships with the Thomanerchor, the Bach Archive, Leipzig and the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. Through his leadership, Valparaiso University has established a strong relationship with the St. Thomas Church - a relationship now formalized with an agreement of future collaboration, the only such agreement with an American university. In October 2017, he led the Valparaiso University Chorale as the only international choir to be invited to the 500th anniversary celebration of the Reformation in Wittenberg, Germany, including appearances on October 31, 2017 at the St. Thomas Church and the Castle Church. In recognition of his work creating and sustaining these musical relationships in Germany, the President of the Federal Republic of Germany awarded him (in 2017) the Cross of the Order of Merit for “extraordinary service” rendered to German-American relations in the field of music.

As a solo artist, Dr. Cock has enjoyed a career spanning 40 years, specializing in concert and song literature. His critically acclaimed performances as a Bach Evangelist, a role he has performed approximately 100 times, featured appearances with many major ensembles, including numerous important Bach festivals. His performance in St. Matthew Passion, under the direction of Helmuth Rilling, with the Los Angeles Philharmonic (2001) was praised by the LA Times for its “illuminating freshness.” He has appeared as tenor soloist on numerous recordings, including with the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and with Maestro Robert Shaw and the Robert Shaw Festival Singers.

Dr. Cock studied at the University of Southern California and completed his undergraduate study at Pacific Lutheran University. He holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Arizona (Tucson), where he was a student of Maurice Skones.

ABOUT THE SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

The Valparaiso University Symphony Orchestra is a select ensemble dedicated to professional performance standards of works from both the standard and contemporary repertoires. Students of all areas of study are welcome to participate. Recent performances have included music by Beethoven (Symphonies 5, 8, 9), Brahms (Symphonies 1, 2, 4), Mendelssohn (Symphonies 4, 5), Rachmaninoff (Piano Concerto No. 2), Shostakovich (Symphony 5, Piano Concerto 2), Sibelius (Symphonies 1, 2), Tchaikovsky (Symphonies 4, 5), Mahler (Symphony 2), Britten (Sea Interludes), Elgar (Enigma Variations), Holst (The Planets), Respighi (Pines of Rome), Strauss (Death and Transfiguration), and Stravinsky (Firebird Suite). In 2018, the VUSO served as the anchor ensemble for the second annual Friendship Lasts Forever gala concert, which was held at Pritzker Pavilion in Millennium Park, the premier outdoor performance venue in Chicago. In the spring of 2018, they toured China for the second time. For many years, the VUSO has hosted the Great Lakes Music Festival, welcoming traditional musicians from China, as well as high school students from Indiana, Illinois, and Michigan.

The Valparaiso University Chorale continues to earn acclaim as one of the top Lutheran collegiate choirs in the United States, upholding the highest standard of choral art through performance of the greatest choral literature of all eras and preserving the University's rich choral tradition, which dates back to the early 20th century. The mixed voice ensemble performs an eclectic repertoire that spans from traditional to significant contemporary works, all in their original languages, and to selections that express multicultural perspectives.

By invitation from the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany, the Chorale was the only international ensemble invited to perform at the celebrations of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation on October 31, 2017. They were also invited by Thomaskantor Gottold Schwarz to join the Thomanerchor, the famous boy's choir once led by Johann Sebastian Bach, in performance during the Reformation Day services at the St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, Germany. The Chorale has served six residencies at the St. Thomas Church—the only collegiate American choir to enjoy such a strong relationship with the church of J.S. Bach. In June 2012, the Chorale was invited by the Bach Archive in Leipzig to perform at the Bach Festival that celebrated the 800th anniversary of the St. Thomas Church and the Thomanerchor.
